What's Blooming Now

<u>Cattleya</u>

THE GENUS CATTLEYA

History: - The first published account of any member of this genus to bloom in Europe appeared in Loddiges' BOTANICAL CABINET (t. 337) where it was illustrated and described as Epidendrum violaceum in 1819. Earlier, however, in 1818, Dr. W. T- Hooker had bloomed an allied species in his greenhouse in Suffolk, England, but he neither described it nor published any account of it at the time. The plant had been collected by Mr. William Swainson that year in the Organ Mountains about 60 miles north of Rio de Janeiro in Brazil, and a division of the same plant was obtained by Mr. 'William Cattley, a patron of horticulture and one of the first amateurs to form a collection of exotic orchids, his collection being the finest then known. When this new and beautiful orchid bloomed



in November, 1823 (the exact year is not certain as dates seldom accompanied the publications issued at this period), it was forwarded to the eminent orchidologist. Dr. John Lindley. who described it as

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Cattleya labiata in his COLLECTANEA BOTANICA, t. 33 (1824), establishing a new genus which he named in honor of Mr. Cattley. Recognizing at the same time the kinship of the earlier Epidendrum violaceum of Loddiges, he renamed this Cattleya loddigesii. Thus the genus from its very inception was based on the two fundamental growth forms of Cattleya, the labiata form with one leaf and the bifoliate, or two-leaved, forms. The name "labiata" was applied because the lip was so prominent a part of the flower.

After the first importation from Mr. Swainson, no more plants similar to the original Cattleya labiata were discovered for many decades, although many varieties of this species were found. Each variety differed in some way from the plant of Mr. Cattley, either in color, blooming season or some similar horticultural aspect. Botanically, most of these one-leaved forms were considered as varieties and sub-varieties of Cattleya labiata. the original being termed C. labiata vera or the "true Cattleya labiata." As the number of variants grew to enormous proportions, and as hybridization began to utilize these forms, the cumbersome botanical nomenclature was modified and the varietal names were raised, in practice, to specific rank. Thus we speak of Cattleya mossiae, Cattleya dowiana, Cattleya trianae, etc., rather than use the botanically correct name such as Cattleya labiata var. dowiana sub-var. aurea, for instance. Dave Miller retired from the corporate Information Technology field after thirty-two years in various capacities of software support and development. He then spent three years in the horticulture industry as a perennial plant specialist at a local regional nursery.

Dave and his wife, Mary Jo, live in Niles, Ohio USA. He is currently Trustee of the Greater Akron (Ohio) Orchid Society after having been President and Program Chair and is also a member of the Orchid Society of Western Pennsylvania in Pittsburgh, the Greater Cleveland Orchid Society and the West Shore Orchid Society in Strongsville, Ohio. Orchid Gems: Hossein Noorbaksh

Hossein Noorbaksh is one of our Society's most expert growers. Friendly, with a witty charm and a selfdeprecating manner, he is often seen talking about a beautifully blooming plant that he has brought in for our Show and Tell Table.

Hossein, why don't you tell us a little about yourself?

"I am 74 years old recently retired physician. Born in Iran, I came to the United States after finishing medical school. I completed a residency in Cleveland and then moved to Pittsburgh to take up an Ob-Gyn residency. That is when I met my wife, who was a nursing student. We got married about a year and a half later and we have three children, five grandkids (with one on the way), and live in Mt. Lebanon."

What was your first orchid?

"I got my very first 2-3 orchids when I lived in Cleveland. I visited New Orleans about 40-42 years ago, went to an orchid nursery, and bought 2-3 cattleyas. (Laughs) I killed them!

When I bought my first home, it had a small greenhouse, and so I started buying orchids again. I also added a small greenhouse to my current house and then about 7 years ago, I built an even larger one. I needed more room and better heating and plumbing. So my wife and my kids pushed me to build a bigger one."

Tell us about your collection and your "favorites"

"I love paphs the most, and second to that, the phragmipediums. These are my favorites but I also have oncidiums, cattleyas and other species. I do love species and have many of them. I have about 600 orchids altogether. These are mostly intermediate growers.

I grow many orchids from seedlings. I love seedlings. I enjoy the way that they grow. To me, orchids are not just the blooms, but also the whole plant. I like looking at the roots and the leaves and seeing how the plant is growing. I used to do some pollinations, but I gave it up because I was not experienced enough and they all died. As I get older I want to make sure that I get to see the results."

As for my orchid culture, I grow my paphs and phrags in plastic pop bottles. I cut off the top and make a lot of holes around the container on the sides and bottom using a small electric soldering tip. I generally use a mix of Orchiata bark, charcoal and diatomite (diatomaceous earth).

I know that some of your plants received national awards.

"In the past couple of years, I've received both a CCM (Certificate of Cultural Merit) and an HCC (Highly Commended Certificate) for Paph. niveum 'Katheryn', which is named after my granddaughter and my wife. My awarded Phrag. richteri 'Maggie' AM/AOS honors my other granddaughter.

My favorite miniature mounted orchid is an Oberonia rufilabris 'Jaleh'. I actually got a CCM on it. I named it after both my sister and one of my grandkids. Jaleh means 'morning dew' in Persian."

What is your funniest/weirdest mistake or experience?


"When I was a resident, I lived in an apartment that was steam heated. I grew my plants on a radiator by a window that opened. They died very fast. It was a sad thing, but it was funny: One side of each plant froze to death and the other side fried to death."

When did you join the society & why?

"My older son and I joined the OSWP about 29-30 years ago when we visited an Orchid Show. We met Demetria and Bud Mellot, and Bud gave my son a mounted orchid plant, which we killed in about a month."

Final words:

"I enjoy the people in the OSWP. It's such an interesting group of people: they are amazing, the food is good, and everyone is very pleasant and very helpful. So I have found a lot of friends."


