What's Blooming Now

Dendrobium loddigesii

Dendrobium loddigesii is native to Laos, Vietnam, Guangdong, Guangxi, Guizhou, Hainan and Yunnan provinces of China and Hong Kong. In Laos, they grow in the Xieng Khounang area. They are usually found at an altitude of 1000-1500 m, but they were met even at an altitude of only 400 m. In China, they grow in the mountains in the east, at an altitude of about 1370 m of the Yunnan Province, on rocks 240 km southwest of Guangzhou tin he island of Hainan and the Kwangtung Province. Near Hong Kong, they grow at heights of about 1000 m.

Light: level of 20000-30000 lux.

Temperature: The average temperature of the summer day is 75-77 ° F, the night 68 ° F, giving a daily difference of 4-5 ° F. These plants do not tolerate hot summer weather. In winter the average day temperature is 52-58 ° F, night 45-50 ° f, giving a daily difference of 4-5 ° C.



Growing media and repotting: Dendrobium loddigesii is best mounted on tree fern rootstock due of their creeping, hanging

Watering: This species must be constantly moist during the growing season from spring to autumn, but when new growths reach maturity in autumn, the amount of water should be gradually reduced.

Rest period: Dendrobium loddigesii requires a cold (50 ° F), dry rest to initiate flowering. If winter temperatures are low, the amount of water should be reduced and the plants should be allowed to dry between watering. However, they cannot stay dry for too long Fertilization should be reduced or eliminated.

I hope everyone has moved their warmer growers inside, so you can move them outside again when things warm up again! But just keep in mind- it will keep changing, so if you have cold intolerant plants you treasure, just let them stay put inside until next summer. Our Zoom meetings have been successful- having our main speaker via Zoom has been a revelation! Much easier for everyone, and the format still allows for live questions at the end. Our next meeting, October 18, will be via Zoom. Anyone who has not participated in the Zoom experience should give it a try. If I can do it, you can do it!

We will have a mini class at 1:30pm on growing and flowering nobile dendrobiums.

Dave Springer and Kathy Arria are working on a panel discussion on general orchid culture, with lots of opportunities for questions. Nancy Kline reported at our last meeting that we are still unable to resume Pfun at Phipps at this time, due to Covid restrictions. We miss our wonder-

Nobile-type and other cold weather deciduous Dendrobium - Raj Popat

Please join myself and the O.S.W.P. for the mini-class prior to the October 2020 meeting. Raj Popat has offered to discuss the culture of Nobile-type Dendrobiums and other similar deciduous Dendrobiums. These Dendrobiums prefer / NEED a cool to cold dry period fall — spring in order to set their buds. A lot of failure to flower these plants is due to growing them too warm and not permitting them their normal dormancy. These orchids put out quite a display of color on leafless or nearly leafless canes. Raj is an expert level Dendrobium grower, as exhibited by his plants often found exhibited in the O.S.W.P. display and the O.S.W.P. show and tell table.
