What's Blooming Now

These striking orchids, which are also known as pansy orchids, owing to their similarity to garden pansies, are enjoying increasing popularity.

<u>Miltoniopsis are cool-growing orchids</u> that originate in the higher elevations of the Andes in Colombia, Panama and Ecuador. The warmer-growing species, properly miltonias, originate from the Minas Gerais area of Brazil and more closely resemble large-flowered oncidiums. Their flowers can be brilliantly patterned.

They can be grown here in Pittsburgh if you keep them cool by air movement (fans) and kept our of direct sun. They are epiphytes and grow like cattleyas. Potting media needs to be fine and never let it become completely dry. Fertilize very weakly every watering. They can bloom any time of the year.

American Orchid Society award

Taylor Slaughter: One of our own receives national prestigious American Orchid Society award

Many long-term OSWP members know Taylor and Frank Slaughter. Even a brief snapshot of their accomplishments is breathtaking. The couple served as Presidents of the OSWP and often opened their home and greenhouse to host an amazing array of fun events including Society holiday parties, picnics, Culture Study Group and Award Study Group. In a nutshell, they were more than generous with their time,



effort, and willingness to share their knowledge as they spent 6 years becoming AOS judges.

Frank and Taylor moved to Philadelphia several years ago, but generally return to help with AOS judging at our March Show. It's a time for renewing friendships, catching up, and continuing to learn from their vast experience.

And so now for the News: in recognition of over 30 years of longstanding effort, Taylor has been awarded the very prestigious Thomas Sheehan Award for Outstanding Service by an AOS Volunteer (Orchids Magazine, May 2023).

This award "recognizes and applauds a member who has demonstrated sustained and exemplary volunteer service that leaves a lasting positive impact on the AOS."

And to quote: "Taylor Slaughter's contributions to the AOS span more than four decades (1980s–present) at both local and national levels. Her remarkable achievements have consistently supported and strengthened the AOS."

Here's a quick run-through of some of Taylor's important roles: Taylor chaired the National Capital Judging Center in DC (1990–2003, 2014–2018). She has also served as an AOS Trustee (2003–2004, 2007–2011), an AOS vice president (2005–2006), and was the first chairperson of the Governance Committee (2008-2012). As chair of the AOS Judging Committee (2018–2022), she instituted many innovations, even during the COVID-19 epidemic.

Taylor and her husband, Frank, who has also spearheaded many AOS projects, were previously honored (2013) with an AOS silver medal for their creative reconfiguration of the annual year-end special awards. Appointed an honorary vice president in 2014, Taylor continues to provide advice to the Board on an ongoing basis.

Orchid Gems - No Grass Grows Under Their Feet: Chuck and Julia Oldenburg

What are you doing at 5:30 in the morning? Well, if you are retired and like me, you are still in bed.

Not so for Chuck and Julia Oldenburg! These self-starters are early-morning risers. He's off to the gym, and she's off on a three-mile walk with a neighbor. And that's before the work of the day begins. Chuck and Julia's enthusiasm for life is apparent in everything they do, and their scope of interests is wide. He's a runner, mountain climber and endurance hiker whose goal is to hike the 2,190 miles



of the Appalachian Trail which stretches from northern Maine to Georgia. He has accomplished over 450 miles so far, taking the trail section by section, only recently returning from a 6-day, 103.8-mile hike through central Virginia. This is even more impressive when one considers that he is carrying everything he needs to survive with him, a 45-pound load. This is really what some might consider "roughing it". Next on the agenda is climbing Mount Elbert, the tallest mountain in Colorado in August. Naturally, physical training for the big event is always on his agenda.

Julia might not share Chuck's passion for endurance hiking, but she is no slouch, taking 45-minute walks before work, and accompanying Chuck on the rugged 10-mile hike of Maggie's Peak in California. Her interests are more home-centered, and are steeped in the traditions of her Greek heritage.

Chuck and Julia have been married for over thirty years, have three adult daughters, and live in Venetia, Washington County. They met in college at Penn State. He was a chemical engineer, and she was a math teacher.

During Chuck's upbringing and career, he moved around a lot and has lived in Rhode Island, Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, North Carolina, Michigan, and now Pennsylvania for the last twenty-five years. He considers this area his hometown, and his parents came to settle down in Center Township, which is in my own native Beaver County.

So, as a native Beaver Countian, I was naturally delighted to discover that Julia's hometown is Beaver Falls, about eight miles from my hometown of Rochester.

Julia grew up with a lush Greek tradition. Her mother was from Greece, and relatives still live there. Family, church, and food are an important part of the culture.

"The Greeks believe that, when somebody comes, you feed them," says Julia. "I like to make people happy, and I love to host."

Julia prepares traditional Greek dishes, such avgolemono, a lemon chicken and rice soup, spinach pie (spanakopita), and pastitsio, a Greek lasagna. Her cookies are her specialty that always has people asking for more.

She bakes 15 different kinds of cookies and freezes them for entertaining and gifting later. She makes her lady locks from scratch, which entails letting the dough sit overnight, and, of course, she makes that universal Greek favorite, baklava.

"My mother made six kinds of Greek cookies, and my two brothers and I would go to school with big bags full of them. The teachers loved to receive them during the holiday season."

Julia is well known for her cookies. When her daughters come home for Christmas, they and their future in-laws get platters. Neighbors look forward to receiving them. Her sister-in-law requested them for her daughter's wedding. Baking is Julia's hobby, and she is glad to accommodate.

Early in their marriage, the Oldenburg's lived in North Carolina, and then in Michigan. After the birth of their first daughter, however, they returned to the Pittsburgh area so that their children could experience the joy of grandparents and a close-knit extended family.

As a chemical engineer, Chuck worked in a variety of industries and held many different positions. His business acumen pushed him towards entrepreneurial opportunities. In 2000, they ventured into real estate and started a property management business which they still operate.

In 2014, inspired by the burgeoning Marcelus Shale business, he and Julia utilized commercial space in

one of their buildings in Washington county to open a retail store offering safety products to the gas and oil industry. The retail business was a perfect fit for Julia, since the girls were older and she did not want to return to teaching. The pandemic allowed them to reduce their storefront hours to four hours a day, five days a week. Technology has made it possible to conduct much business online. After nine years, the business continues to thrive. "I always have to be doing something," Chuck comments.

Maintaining and monitoring his collection of 1,000+ orchids and other plants certainly is a large requirement of time and energy. Like many couples in the OSWP, Chuck is the orchidist while Julia is the supporter, pursuing her hobbies of cooking, baking and attending the All Saints Greek Orthodox Church in Canonsburg.

Chuck had an early acquaintance with orchids; his mother had an orchid greenhouse. His own interest in plants began in his teens. He had bonsai and other small plants that he maintained through college, solicitous to the point of transporting them home during breaks.

When he first built his greenhouse in 1999, it was devoted to tropicals. He had little interest in orchids until his mother gave him an overgrown cymbidium that, to his surprise, flowered magnificently. This was enough to create an interest. Soon he was hooked and slowly converted the tropical greenhouse into an orchid greenhouse over years.

Chuck maintains his orchids in a greenhouse and summers many outside in a protected area. There are other plants in his collection, including a Navel Orange and jaboticaba (Brazilian grape tree) that are 30 years old. Chuck also grows amorphophallus and over a dozen varieties of figs for Julia which are her favorite.

Although Chuck has a wide mix of orchids, his specialty is Cattleya. He has been slowly upgrading his collection with cattleya species and rare heirloom hybrids in recent years.

In the winter, he makes orchid pots. He has a pottery wheel and four kilns for different size pots and styles of firing. "In 2010, I set a goal to have each of my plants in one of my pots," says Chuck. "I'm about forty percent finished."

A rich and busy life is a satisfying one.

Dave Motak Wins the Gloria Artis Medal for Contributions to Polish Culture

Dave Motak is remarkable in many ways. As an OSWP Board Member, Dave is a wellspring of imaginative and fertile ideas. Most recently, the Society benefited from his superb publicity campaign during our last Orchid Show.

However, to the world at large, Dave is much better known for his creations in the szopka art form. This form of folk art has its origins in Cracow, Poland, where wood, cardboard, foil paper, and other media are used to create "whimsical interpretations of architectural motifs in elaborate structures... (https://davidmotak.com/)."

For his substantial contributions to the promotion of Polish culture and heritage over the past 50 years, Dave has been internationally recognized.

Most recently, Dave attended a ceremony at the Polish Consulate in New York City where he was awarded the highest decoration of the Republic of Poland -- the Gloria Artis Medal for Merit to Culture. This is a singular honor for an American citizen, because the Gloria Artis Medal is typically only bestowed upon Polish citizens who distinguish themselves in the field of arts and culture.

Dave has a long resume. As an undergraduate, he studied two years abroad at Jagiellonian University in Cracow. He was the first foreigner to participate in the annual Szopka Competition in Cracow, where he won an award for artistic excellence. His accolades include the prestigious Work of Art Award from the Greater Pittsburgh Arts Council, and he was honored by the City of Pittsburgh with the proclamation of "David Motak Day" in 2011.

He has contributed as a writer and editor to Sokol Polski, the publication of Polish Falcons of America, and has exposed others to the szopka artform by conducting workshops. On the urging of his students, he hosted tours to Poland.

He was solicited by the prestigious Gagosian Gallery in New York to exhibit his work, and, upon another occasion, he and his partner Jack were flown to Hong Kong for an exhibition of 15 of his art pieces.

Congratulations to Dave on yet another achievement!
