## **OUR GUEST: November Monthly Meeting Speaker**





## **ORCHID GEMS - Aaron Goldman and Sherri Kinoshita**

## Many Doors of Opportunity: Aaron Goldman and Sherri Kinoshita

One thing I have learned by doing the "Orchid Gems" feature is that every member of OSWP whom I interview is fascinating in one respect or another, always an individual out of the ordinary.

What impressed me about Aaron Goldman was his versatility, the ease with which he has changed direction and taken a different path because the timing was right for him to do so.

A native of Penn Township in Butler County, Aaron attended Allegheny College where he graduated

with a Bachelor of Science degree, majoring in biology with a minor in chemistry and psychology.

After graduation, he and a friend went to Seattle where he taught pre-school, having enjoyed a brief stint in college. "I was always good with kids because I'm a kid at heart myself. I love their boundless energy and wild imaginations."

I understand completely. Like me, Aaron and his wife Sherri are toy enthusiasts. They enjoy scouting Ross Park Mall, Facebook Marketplace, and other venues for unusual and collectible Legos. Aaron also collects Furbies, the robotic toys that were much in demand when marketed in 1998 and continue to be highly sought-after. During the pandemic, shortages of microchips due to delayed shipments postponed the refurbishing of ailing Furbies, but now this will become Aaron's winter project.



When his mother became ill, Aaron returned from Seattle to Butler County, and he taught pre-school at the YMCA. His reminiscences of Seattle's coffee



scene, however, prompted him to associate himself with the local Pittsburgh specialty coffee scene, his favorite being Constellation Coffee on Penn Avenue in the Bloomfield section of Pittsburgh. It can be said that Aaron learned the coffee trade from the ground up, eventually managing a shop.

Aaron's flexible nature has given him the opportunity to work in various fields. Disparaging tedium and office politics, he eventually enrolled in Coding Bootcamp on the Northside to follow a career that would give him the freedom to work remotely. Since then, he has worked for several companies, and is currently employed by Crowe, an international public accounting, consulting, and technology firm.

In February 2019, Aaron accepted an invitation to visit Hawaii from a college friend who had joined the Navy, and was stationed at Pearl Harbor. This would be a life-changer.



It was during his vacation in Hawaii that Aaron met his wife Sherri. They took an immediate liking to each other and, when Aaron returned home, they continued to communicate by video.

As the relationship grew serious, Aaron returned to Hawaii in August 2019 to see whether he and Sherri were truly compatible. Two weeks after returning to Pennsylvania, Aaron moved to Hawaii.

Despite Hawaii's reputation as a paradise, Aaron reflects that it's a great place to visit, but perhaps not to live. Commuters can spend hours confronting six lanes of traffic on busy freeways. The cost of living is high, and the heat can be overbearing.


Moreover, working remotely in Hawaii necessitated Aaron's being up in the middle of the night to keep in touch with colleagues and business partners on Eastern Standard Time.

So, when he and Sherri married in February 2020, they moved to Pennsylvania just ahead of the Covid pandemic.



Although she was raised in Hawaii, many of Sherri's family members had already followed her aunt and uncle to Montana, where they had started a bedand-breakfast. Aaron's family continue to live in the Pittsburgh area. Two years ago, Aaron and Sherri bought a house in McCandless near Ross Park Mall.

Like so many OSWP members, Aaron had an early exposure to gardening. His father flew a mail plane and was on the road, so the family spent a lot time at his grandparents'. His grandmother had



houseplants, and he often helped her in the garden.

Now with a home and yard, Aaron grows native plants, and favors fruit-bearers and pollinators. He especially recommends mountain mint as a deer deterrent and wonderful pollinator.

Orchid fever was something Aaron didn't catch right away. "I was impressed by the Orchid Room at Phipps, but I thought that too much work was involved in orchid-growing."

Then he was tempted by a "Better Grow" orchid at Lowe's and thought that he would give it a try. "When I become interested in something, I become obsessive," says Aaron.



Aaron began collecting orchids a year-and-a-half

ago, and now has approximately 50 specimens. One-third of them are rescue orchids.

Besides Phalaenopsis, his collection includes Cattleya, Dendrobium, Habenaria, Phragmipedium, and Epidendroideae.

"I like fragrant orchids, and I don't even care if they smell weird," Aaron comments. A referral from a friend connected him to an orchid greenhouse in Lancaster, Pennsylvania which carries non-hybrid Phalaenopsis. He has discovered that these are more fragrant than hybrid varieties.

"Orchids were once a rare commodity, but now people are accustomed to seeing them for sale." Aaron remarks. Phalaenopsis, with its simple beauty and long-lasting flowers, has made hobbyists of many consumers.

"While attending the OSWP Spring Orchid Show, we found out about the Society and thought it would be a fun way to connect with other people who share in this hobby. Especially as we had not been growing orchids for very long."

Aaron has advice for growers. "Don't stress the small things. It is possible to over-care orchids and kill them. They are hardier than you think."


