Also each plant should have a name tag with genus / species / cultivar , or NOID

How to fill out this Inventory Sheet (see attachment)

1) Inventory ID – This is an unique identifier for each item. It should be your initials and unique number, eg. CB4, for the fourth item on Carolyn Bolton's inventory list. If you have multiples of the same plant at the same price, they should all have the same number, see point 2.

2) # of Plants: If you have multiples of the same plant at the same price, write the total number of plants in the # of Plants column, we will check them off as they are sold.

3) Description: Plant name or brief item description of other orchid related items, eg. 5" clay orchid pot

4) Price Each: Please record your desired price for each item.

We encourage everyone to fill the inventory sheets out ahead of time. You can print off as many copies as you need (see the attachment in this newsletter). We will have blank sheets available, but you need an inventory sheet to be paid! Options:

Orchid Gems - Giving and Getting Back -- Cam and Susan Schmidt

When I spoke with Cam and Susan Schmidt, I was immediately impressed by their commitment to volunteerism, and how service to others had led to relationships that are unbroken by distance. Giving back to the community is how Cam and Susan Schmidt make a city their home, whether it's their native New York, Washington, D.C., or Pittsburgh.

Hailing from Manhattan and Brooklyn, Cam and Susan met as graduate students at the American University in Washington, D.C., where he was studying international relations and finance, and she, English literature. They found employment locally after graduation, and stayed, building a life in Bethesda, Maryland and raising a son.

Susan and Cam were brought up with a strong tradition of volunteerism, which they have passed down to their son. Cam had played youth soccer, and so it was natural for him to coach youth soccer in Bethesda, especially since his son also played the sport. Becoming more active, he eventually sat on the board of directors of a youth club.

As a girl in New York City, Susan had been a candy-striper, volunteering her time to assist the hospital staff. In Bethesda, Maryland, she poured her passion for books, art and history into The Friends of the Library and the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture.

Cam has been a self-employed investment advisor for over thirty years. Susan is a recently retired teacher. "I miss the kids, but that void is filled by the pleasure I get watching my grandchildren," Susan says.

The desire to be near their son and his family fueled the Schmidt's move from Bethesda to Pittsburgh during the pandemic. Their son had gone to the University of Pittsburgh for engineering, and had found a job, married, and settled down in Mt. Lebanon with his wife and two boys, ages six and three. Although the decision to leave Bethesda was difficult because they had so many friends, Susan and Cam decided it was more important to be near their grandchildren as they were growing up. They now are living in Upper St. Clair.

As recent arrivals in the city, Cam and Susan enjoy touring the area and involving themselves in their new community. For Cam, that's volunteering at Phipps Conservatory; for Susan, that's volunteering at the Heinz History Center.

Cam is the orchid grower; Susan considers herself a "foster mom." There are many "foster moms and dads" in OSWP – partners of orchid-growers who don't grow orchids but are nonetheless important contributors to this society. "Orchids bring people together," Susan comments. She shares Cam's pleasure in a blooming or spiking orchid.

Cam has always enjoyed gardening, but his interest in orchids was piqued when Susan received an orchid for Christmas years ago. To raise his level of enthusiasm, he was able to avail himself of the United States Botanical Garden and other orchid collections throughout the Washington area.

Orchid-rescuing is a challenge that Cam enjoys. "It's satisfying to give an orchid some care and attention and see it come back to life," Cam says. "Orchids are hardy and durable plants, but they need the right conditions."

Like all growers, Cam has killed his share of orchids. "Some make it, and some don't. I grow what works

for me, and if it doesn't work, I don't take it personally," Cam remarks philosophically.

He has always grown his orchids in his office under artificial lights, a humidifier, and a fan. Then there is the matter of trial and error. Some people outdoor their orchids in the summer, but Cam's attempt ended in disaster in Maryland when aphids attacked and destroyed the collection. He then turned his attention to his outdoor garden which he would have loved to have moved to Pittsburgh. He had to leave that and about a dozen orchids behind when he and Susan left Bethesda.

Looking for volunteer opportunities in Pittsburgh, Cam and Susan quickly turned to Phipps and the Heinz History Center. Attending the OSWP Orchid Show last year led to their becoming members. Speaking about Phipps and OSWP's 'Pfun at Phipps' collaboration, Cam says, "The Phipps collection is extensive and varied, and Giovanny is amazing. The volunteers I work with have been so welcoming and generous, sharing their extensive knowledge."

Cam has learned a lot through his Phipps experience. "It is difficult to understand why a plant might thrive and why it might die. Beginners sometimes don't realize that different orchids require different environments." He's at the repotting table at the OSWP Orchid Show this year, more confident because of his exposure at Phipps.

The Schmidt's are happy to be at home in Pittsburgh sharing the lives of their son and his family and making new friends in the community, but the relationships they've forged with their friends and colleagues in the Washington, D.C., area haven't changed. Cam is always on hand to address business inquiries from his clients, and the road between Washington and Pittsburgh runs both ways, so they see plenty of old friends, often the parents of their son's friends or of the children whom Cam once coached. They have had a chance to showcase the Pittsburgh attractions. "We've taken the Trolley Tour with friends several times now," Susan remarks.

The physical demands of coaching make it impossible for Cam to resume that activity, but he and Susan enjoy watching their grandsons play the game. Low-impact yoga is more their style, and something they can enjoy together.

Cam and Susan demonstrate that volunteering and serving others, giving life and sharing it, is a rich and joyful way to live, so why not go out and rescue an orchid today?

Orchid Society of Western Pennsylvania (OSWP) General Meeting February 19, 2023

The meeting was held at Phipps Garden Center. (The April OSWP meeting will be held at our new location, The Spartan Community Center, 134 E. Elizabeth St., Pittsburgh, PA. 15207)

A mini-class presented by Chuck Oldenberg re "Growing Show Quality Cattleyas" began at 1:00 pm. The business portion of the meeting was called to order at approx. 1:45 pm by Co-Presidents Michelle and Dave Panasiuk.

Old Business:

a. Crawford Estate Donations: OSWP and Phipps met together to take possession of the items from the Crawford Estate. No items remain in the rented storage facility. It is the intent of the OSWP officers to sell and/or raffle many of the items at the Annual Orchid Shows.

b. Raj Popat Orchid Collection – Sheila Nathanson, Michelle Burton and Mike Lysy met at Raj's home to take possession of his donated orchid collection. They are in the process of repotting many of the orchids and it is OSWP's intent to offer the orchids for sale at the March Orchid Show.

c. Show Exhibit Storage – OSWP is in need of a 5' x 7' storage space to replace the facility that has been used for the last number of years. That space will soon be sold and will not be available to OSWP. The new space does not need to be temperature controlled, merely dry and secure. If anyone has space they can provide to OSWP (or suggestions for appropriate space), please contact Michelle and Dave Panasiuk.

New Business:

Spring Show Planning:

Many volunteers are still needed, in nearly every capacity and on nearly every day. The website is up and running, although there is a small glitch that Jingua is correcting. Show trophy sponsorships are available.

Food is needed for the Show volunteers and vendors. No cooking or cleaning facilities are available. Hot food should come in a crockpot or similar item. All utensils that are to be returned to owner need to be marked.

Dave Motak is working on advertising and has made connection with many types of media to promote the Show (including newspapers, facebook, radio and even the Home and Garden Show).

OSWP is still looking for sponsors to take ads in the Show brochures.

Reports:

a. Newsletter: Jim Yamber noted that articles are due on the 20th of the month to allow for editing and distribution.

b. Treasurer: Janet Greenburg presented the Treasurer's report.
